FREE SEMINAR ON CONSERVING CUPAR'S HISTORIC BUILDINGS

Stone and Slate Survey Conserves Cupar's Historic Buildings

Fife Council and Fife Historic Buildings Trust are pleased that the Scottish Lime Centre Trust has completed stone and slate building research of the historic centre of Cupar. Local people, contractors and professionals are invited to a free seminar on Monday 10 April 2017, 9.30am - 12.30pm at the County Buildings, to find out more about the survey and the importance of stone and mortar matching when undertaking building repairs.

The survey report outlines the condition and conservation needs of Cupar's significant architectural heritage and identifies suitable matching stone and slate for use in repairs. As part of the survey, individual mini-surveys of the majority of the buildings in the town centre were also prepared. Building owners can request a copy free of charge from Fife Historic Buildings Trust.

Speakers at the seminar will include Marcus Paine of Hutton Stone on dimensional stone quarrying and Tony Carter from Keim Paints talking about possible solutions for Cupar's painted stone facades. The Scottish Lime Centre Trust's Building Surveyor, Stacey Rowntree, will cover the key points of the survey and how these issues can be resolved through repairs and maintenance. Dr Callum Graham, Building Materials Analyst, will discuss the importance of stone matching and physical tests for good stone compatibility as well mortar analysis and the findings in Cupar. Fiona Stenke, Project Officer at Fife Historic Buildings Trust, said: "This stone survey has been a really useful exercise for Cupar, and we hope that the report and the seminar on 10 April will benefit a wide range of people, from homeowners wishing to understand the repair needs of their building, to contractors and professionals looking for detailed technical information. Roz Artis, the Scottish Lime Centre Trust's Director, added: "Our multi-disciplinary survey team comprised of building surveyors, a stonemason, geologist and an architectural historian to give the most comprehensive understanding and analysis of the building fabric of Cupar".
